# MURDER LIBRARY REVEALED

Prosecutor:  
 Accused  
 killer  
 had a  
 gruesome  
 collection

DEDHAM — A collection of books found in the Walpole home of accused killer Martin Guy's mother years after the murder of 75-year-old Irene Kennedy included the titles "The A to Z Encyclopedia of Serial Killers," "True Crime Serial Killers," and "Four Teenage Girls, One Gruesome Murder: Cruel Sacrifice."

In day two of the murder trial, Massachusetts State Police Sgt. Scott Jennings read titles of Guy's books to the Norfolk County jury at the prompting of prosecutor Robert Nelson.

Guy is accused of murdering the Foxborough woman in Walpole's Francis William Bird park on Dec. 1, 1998. She was beaten, strangled and stabbed

32 times.

Nelson questioned the state trooper yesterday to show that the books belonged to Guy, not, as defense attorney Robert Jubinville had suggested, a public library.

"No," Jennings said when Nelson asked him if it appeared the books could have come from a library.

Police found the books in the home of Guy's mother when they were investigating him years after the murder of Kennedy.

Police and the prosecutor say DNA evidence found in a bite mark on the victim's breast is a match for Guy. But before they charged him, they arrested and detained Edmund Burke, who lives at the edge of the park and has a brother who is

married to Kennedy's daughter. Police claimed that one of the bite marks on the woman matched Burke's teeth, but later dropped the allegation when DNA evidence excluded the Walpole man.

Jubinville in his cross-examination of Jennings drew attention to Burke. The attorney has said part of his defense will be to try to show that Burke was once a target of the investigation.

Jurors were shown a 45-minute video of Burke's home as police observed it in the days after the Kennedy murder. "The interior was in total disarray," Jennings said. "There was junk basically piled floor to ceiling."

The home was in such chaos, Jennings said, that police had to empty "items" out GUY, Page A10

# Prosecution reveals murder library

of the upper floor just to conduct a search.

Jennings took the stand after the jury spent three hours yesterday morning in Walpole examining the park where Kennedy was murdered and nearby spots. Jurors passed the Domino's Pizza less than a mile from the park where Guy worked as a delivery man at the

time of the slaying.

Guy has since been imprisoned in MCI-Shirley for the 1999 murder of Norwood's Christopher Payne.

Nelson, the prosecutor, directed the jurors in the park to note the heavy tree cover near the crime scene. Jubinville pointed to every trash receptacle in the area. In his opening arguments on Wednesday, Ju-

binville argued police neglected to search the trash cans for evidence.

During a break in the trial, Kathy Burke, daughter of the victim, said she wants Guy kept behind bars for what he allegedly did to her mother. "He's an animal, and he needs to stay behind bars forever," she said.

Kathy Burke is married to John Burke, the brother of Ed-

mund Burke. She said her brother-in-law still suffers from the mistake police made.

She said he is still called a murderer by people on the street. "After he's been cleared, why don't (people) leave him alone? That's what bothers me," she said.
